31<sup>st</sup> January was the feast of the Don Bosco, Italian priest, educator, and writer, founder of the Salesians of Don Bosco, formally known as the Society of Saint Francis de Sales,

## Resolutions suggested by St John Bosco (1815-1888)

- 1. Try to be early for Mass always. A few minutes spent in prayer before Mass can open your soul to wonderful graces.
- 2. When you enter or leave the church take Holy Water and sign yourself with the Sign of the Cross.
- 3. Always genuflect when you enter or leave your seat. This is an Act of Adoration to Almighty God, present in the tabernacle. So take time to genuflect reverently, facing the altar and saying 'My Lord and My God' as your right knee touches the floor.
- 4. Don't talk in church unless absolutely necessary. Talk only to Jesus

  it is Him you have come to visit. Don't talk as you leave either.

  Some people may still be praying.
- 5. Listen to the sermon. It is a message from God which could bear much fruit for you.
- 6. Don't start to leave church until the priest has returned to the Sacristy. Stay to thank God for the Graces you received from Him in the Mass.

#### **COVID REGULATIONS**

# SYNOD 2023 - WHAT NEXT?

#### RESPONSE TO THE DIOCESE AND BEYOND

As asked by the diocese, we submitted our report, based on a Zoom meeting on 26<sup>th</sup> January. The deadline was 31<sup>st</sup> January. It went to Fr John Chandler who is collating the diocesan response, based on the parish responses. He will be sending that to the Catholic Bishops Conference and his deadline is the end of February. Thereafter the national response will be co-ordinated with responses from other Bishops' Conferences throughout the world and these will feed into a Synod of Bishops in Rome in 2023. These Synod meetings usually bear fruit in a papal document, a digest and reflection on the work of the Synod.

#### WHAT HAPPENS LOCALLY?

The process of collecting responses internationally is one in which the contribution of any one parish becomes diluted beyond recognition. Only when there are resounding similarities of observation will our local concerns be reflected and acted upon. However, our very thorough and well-documented discussion does give us an agenda for change and development in our parish life. Particularly important, in my view, is the emphasis on us being open and welcoming, providing proper help and information, opening up our social life together following the plague, relaunching our children's work, re-opening and putting to proper use the St Mary's Parish Room, which is imminently about to be refurbished, thanks to the generosity of the East Hendred Consolidated Catholic Charities. The Standing Committee – which got us through the period of closure during the plague – is morphing into a newly-set-up Pastoral Council, and I hope that those who took part in the Synodal Zoom Meeting, and others drawn to help our re-boot, will serve on this Council.

For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received, that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brethren at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. #### Gospel

# Monday in Week 5 [Year 2]

7<sup>th</sup> February

Reading

1 Kings 8:1-7, 9-13 (RSV)

Dedication of the Temple

8 Then Solomon assembled the elders of Israel and all the heads of the tribes, the leaders of the fathers' houses of the people of Israel, before King Solomon in Jerusalem, to bring up the ark of the covenant of the LORD out of the city of David, which is Zion. <sup>2</sup> And all the men of Israel assembled to King Solomon at the feast in the month Eth'anim, which is the seventh month. 3 And all the elders of Israel came, and the priests took up the ark. 4 And they brought up the ark of the LORD, the tent of meeting, and all the holy vessels that were in the tent; the priests and the Levites brought them up. <sup>5</sup> And King Solomon and all the congregation of Israel, who had assembled before him, were with him before the ark, sacrificing so many sheep and oxen that they could not be counted or numbered. 6 Then the priests brought the ark of the covenant of the LORD to its place, in the inner sanctuary of the house, in the most holy place, underneath the wings of the cherubim. <sup>7</sup> For the cherubim spread out their wings over the place of the ark, so that the cherubim made a covering above the ark and its poles...9 There was nothing in the ark except the two tables of stone which Moses put there at Horeb, where the LORD made a covenant with the people of Israel, when they came out of the land of Egypt. 10 And when the priests came out of the holy place, a cloud filled the house of the LORD, 11 so that the priests could not stand to minister because of the cloud; for the glory of the LORD filled the house of the Lord.

<sup>12</sup> Then Solomon said,

'The LORD has set the sun in the heavens, but has said that he would dwell in thick darkness. <sup>13</sup> I have built you an exalted house, a place for you to dwell in for ever.'

#### Reflection

**TODAY'S** reading has provided inspiration for the consecration services of millions of religious buildings in the last three thousand years. The VIPs – here 'elders of Israel and all the heads of the tribes, the priests and the levites' assemble. We notice the priority given to 'the two tables of stone which Moses put [into the ark] at Horeb'. This is the Word of God as written and this explains the importance of the contents of the ark in synagogue – the scrolls containing the Jewish *Torah* or Law – and also the significance of the Book of Gospels at Mass. Just as 'all the holy vessels' were brought up by the priests and the Levites, so all is made good in the new worship space and, after sacrifice, not 'so many sheep and oxen that they could not be counted or numbered' but the offering of the one Sacrifice of Calvary, the tabernacle is filled with the indwelling Presence of the Blessed Sacrament. The cloud of incense, the prayers of the saints, indicated, for the People of Israel, as indeed for us too, the *shekinah*, the dwelling and settling of the glory of the LORD in our midst.

## Tuesday in Week 5 [Year 2]

## 8<sup>th</sup> February

Reading

1 Kings 8:22-23, 27-30 (RSV)

Solomon's Prayer of Dedication

<sup>22</sup> Then Solomon stood before the altar of the LORD in the presence of all the assembly of Israel, and spread forth his hands toward heaven; <sup>23</sup> and said, 'O LORD, God of Israel, there is no God like you, in heaven above or on earth beneath, keeping covenant and showing mercy to your servants who walk before you with all their heart;... <sup>27</sup> 'But will God indeed dwell on the earth? Behold, heaven and the highest heaven cannot contain you; how much less this house which I have built! <sup>28</sup> Yet have regard to the prayer of your servant and to his supplication, O LORD my God, listening to the cry and to the prayer which your servant prays before you this day; <sup>29</sup> that your eyes may be open night and day toward this house, the

place of which you have said, 'My name shall be there,' that you may listen to the prayer which your servant offers toward this place. <sup>30</sup> And hear the supplication of your servant and of your people Israel, when they pray toward this place; yes, hear you in heaven your dwelling place; and when you hear, forgive.'

#### Reflection

**SOLOMON** begins his prayer by declaring the Lord's uniqueness and faithfulness to his promises. He then seeks confirmation that God will preserve the lineage of David, at first seemingly absolute but now understood conditionally. That section of the prayer (vv.24-26) is omitted in our mass reading but it is significant, in view of subsequent events, that the fulfilment of God's promise to Solomon is a conditional one, a point made three times (the earlier occasions are found in 1 Kings 3:14 and 6:12). For Christians, the absoluteness of the promise is found in Christ, the Son of David. There follows a sophisticated theology of Presence: God is both present in the Temple and yet cannot be confined. His dwelling place is heaven and even heaven and the highest heaven cannot contain him. We must bring this dimension to our understanding of worship and the Eucharist. God is truly present in the Blessed Sacrament of the Altar and yet we cannot limit his Presence in space or time.

## Wednesday in Week 5 [Year 2]

## 9<sup>th</sup> February

**Reading** . 1 Kings 10:1-10 (RSV)

The Visit of the Queen of Sheba

**10** Now when the queen of Sheba heard of the fame of Solomon concerning the name of the LORD, she came to test him with hard questions. <sup>2</sup> She came to Jerusalem with a very great retinue, with camels bearing spices, and very much gold, and precious stones; and when she came to Solomon, she told him all that was on her mind. <sup>3</sup> And Solomon answered all her questions; there was nothing hidden from the king which he could not explain to her. <sup>4</sup> And when the queen of Sheba had seen all the wisdom of Solomon, the house that he had built, <sup>5</sup> the food of his table, the seating of his officials, and the attendance of his servants, their

clothing, his cupbearers, and his burnt offerings which he offered at the house of the LORD, there was no more spirit in her.

<sup>6</sup> And she said to the king, 'The report was true which I heard in my own land of your affairs and of your wisdom, <sup>7</sup> but I did not believe the reports until I came and my own eyes had seen it; and behold, the half was not told me; your wisdom and prosperity surpass the report which I heard. <sup>8</sup> Happy are your wives! Happy are these your servants, who continually stand before you and hear your wisdom! <sup>9</sup> Blessed be the LORD your God, who has delighted in you and set you on the throne of Israel! Because the LORD loved Israel for ever, he has made you king, that you may execute justice and righteousness.' <sup>10</sup> Then she gave the king a hundred and twenty talents of gold, and a very great quantity of spices, and precious stones; never again came such an abundance of spices as these which the gueen of Sheba gave to King Solomon.

#### Reflection

IN AN earlier chapter (1 Kings 5, not in our reading scheme), we learnt more about the fame of King Solomon and the way the emissaries of kings from foreign peoples made their way to Solomon's court. reading gives us an example of one of the people who came. The Queen of Sheba came from what is now thought to have been the South Arabian kingdom of Saba in Yemen. She brought gold, spices, and precious stones - exhibiting and bestowing great wealth. We are in 1 Kings 10 and , if we read to the end of the chapter, we should hear more about Solomon's riches: more gold, some silver, an ornate ivory throne, exotic animals. We discover that much of his wealth is from exacting tribute, but he is also a trader, importing and exporting chariots. Bound up with Solomon's power and wealth is his wisdom: we remember (1 Kings 3) that when the Lord appeared in a dream at Gibeon and asked what gift Solomon would like, Solomon asked for wisdom. This pleased God because he had not asked for self-serving rewards like long-life or the death of his enemies. At the height of Solomon's reign, not only was the wealth of the Israelite kingdom enormous, so was the academic prowess of Jerusalem. Wisdom, it could be said, was at the very centre of things, as books like the Book of Proverbs and the Wisdom of Solomon show.

## Thursday in Week 5 [Year 2]

## 10<sup>th</sup> February

Reading 1 Kings 11:4-13 (RSV)

Solomon's Apostasy incurs Divine Displeasure

When Solomon was old his wives turned away his heart after other gods; and his heart was not wholly true to the LORD his God, as was the heart of David his father. <sup>5</sup> For Solomon went after Ash'toreth the goddess of the Sido'nians, and after Milcom the abomination of the Ammonites. <sup>6</sup> So Solomon did what was evil in the sight of the LORD, and did not wholly follow the LORD, as David his father had done. <sup>7</sup> Then Solomon built a high place for Chemosh the abomination of Moab, and for Molech the abomination of the Ammonites, on the mountain east of Jerusalem. <sup>8</sup> And so he did for all his foreign wives, who burned incense and sacrificed to their gods.

<sup>9</sup> And the LORD was angry with Solomon, because his heart had turned away from the LORD, the God of Israel, who had appeared to him twice, 10 and had commanded him concerning this thing, that he should after other gods; but he did not keep not ao the LORD commanded. 11 Therefore the LORD said to Solomon, 'Since this has been your mind and you have not kept my covenant and my statutes which I have commanded you, I will surely tear the kingdom from you and will give it to your servant. 12 Yet for the sake of David your father I will not do it in your days, but I will tear it out of the hand of your son. 13 However I will not tear away all the kingdom; but I will give one tribe to your son, for the sake of David my servant and for the sake of Jerusalem which I have chosen.'

#### Reflection

**SOLOMON** is derailed finally by preferring the love of foreign women to love of the Lord. Had we begun the Bible passage a verse earlier (11:3), we should have learnt that these foreign women numbered 700 wives and 300 concubines; the emphasis is not on mathematics but on numbers symbolising completion. The foreign women introduced Solomon to other gods and, throughout these historical books, turning away from the Lord to idols is the cardinal sin of apostasy. It seems that wise old Solomon, as he got older, lost his judgment. Despite his massive achievements. He is now compared unfavourably with King David, his father.

Israel in Perpetual Rebellion

At that time, when Jerobo'am went out of Jerusalem, the prophet Ahi'jah the Shi'lonite found him on the road. Now Ahi'jah had clad himself with a new garment; and the two of them were alone in the open country. <sup>30</sup> Then Ahi'jah laid hold of the new garment that was on him, and tore it into twelve pieces. <sup>31</sup> And he said to Jerobo'am, 'Take for yourself ten pieces; for thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, 'Behold, I am about to tear the kingdom from the hand of Solomon, and will give you ten tribes <sup>32</sup> (but he shall have one tribe, for the sake of my servant David and for the sake of Jerusalem, the city which I have chosen out of all the tribes of Israel)....

<sup>19</sup> So Israel has been in rebellion against the house of David to this day.

#### Reflection

THE DEUTERONOMIC history is thought to consist of six books of the Bible - Joshua, Judges, 1 and 2 Samuel, 1 and 2 Kings. They tell the history of Israel from the arrival in the Promised Land to the sack of Jerusalem and the exile in Babylon. Throughout, there is a constant theme: Israel's unfaithfulness, punished by national misfortune. Against that sorry picture, various episodes of well-being are described by way of contrast, but misfortune outdoes happiness – even taking into account the prosperity of King Solomon. Today's reading described the rebellion of Jeroboam, who had been entrusted by Solomon with the repair of the Millo – no one is guite sure what the Millo was, but it was a building work of some sort, part of the ramparts of the city very possibly. Jeroboam felt he was being exploited and rebelled and received a prophecy from Ahijah to the effect that Solomon will lose the kingdom, because of polytheism and idolatry, and that Jeroboam will succeed to ruling over ten of the tribes, though one will remain for Solomon's son. All of this, as we would expect from the Deuteronomic historian, and we would find out a few verses later, is conditional on Jeroboam and his dynasty obeying the commandments and statutes of the Lord.
